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This page gives an overview of the activities in this pack and includes tips and challenges for the adult/teacher/ vocal leader to accompany the child-led activities.

Feel free to adapt and differentiate the activities depending on your pupils and setting.



IF YOU FEEL DIFFERENT.

This activity encourages pupils to think about ways in which they can be kind to others by deciding on an action that makes people feel included and writing it in the hand template, e.g. inviting them to join in games, sitting with them at lunch, etc.

Age: 4-7

- Teacher's tip: Draw on children's experiences here, helping them to remember times when someone has done something kind for them. Use this as inspiration for pupils to decide on their own.
 - Have a go: Make a display of all the hands as a way of celebrating all the ways in which pupils in your school reach out to others and make them feel included.



'SINGING MAKES MY HEART FEEL JOYFUL'

Take a moment to consider how singing makes us feel by asking pupils to complete statements with words or images, such as 'singing makes me feel...' 'My favourite song to sing is...'

Age: 5 - 11

Teacher's tip: Use a hand-held device to record pupils' answers to the questions before doing any writing. Play this back to prompt pupils as they complete the activity. Have a go: Ask staff and wider members of the school

community the questions too about how singing makes them feel and their favourite songs, capturing how the whole school community is impacted by singing.



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THE ROOM KEEPS GETTING **BRIGHTER AS WE SHINE A LIGHT**

Age:	5 – 11
Teacher's tip:	Using the BSL video and the internet (or staff who know
	BSL or Makaton), see how many of the words from the
	word search pupils can learn the signs to.
Have a go:	Sign the lyrics altogether and then have a go at
	singing and signing at the same time.



This activity asks pupils to recognise someone in their class for doing something that they can be proud of and to make a rosette for them. It encourages pupils to see the positive in each other and to celebrate one another's successes and acts of kindness, e.g. I'm proud of you for being patient and waiting your turn on the playground equipment.

Age: 5-11

Teacher's tip: To ensure that everyone receives a rosette you could allocate pupils to one another or spread this activity out, collectively choosing one pupil at the end of each day to receive the recognition.

Have a go: Model this by choosing another member of staff to recognise, explaining why you are proud of them. The more specific and detailed the reason, the greater and more personal the feeling of pride will be.



THE WORLD KEEPS GETTING KINDER. SINGING OUT SIDE BY SIDE

This call to action asks pupils to make a poster about ways in which they can be kinder to the world and the people in it. It could be ways of being kind in school, at home, online or to the environment.

Age: 7-11

Teacher's tip: Encourage pupils to think about not only their own lives but also the wider world and about the difference

YOU ARE LOCKED OUT.

Focusing on the metaphor of being locked out, this exercise encourages pupils to think about how their actions impact on others, and ways in which they can make someone feel included.

Age:	8 – 11
Teacher's tip:	This is a great opportunity to facilitate discussion
	about how and why pupils' actions matter. How does
	their behaviour impact on others? This activity asks
	them to write some actions that they will take this
	week to make someone feel included.
Have a go:	What other metaphors could be used to signify
	patience, kindness etc? Have pupils create their own
	e.g. If your sky is overcast, I'll be your sunshine.

If you feel different, we will take your hand

Everyone can do something simple to make another person's day better and to help them feel included

Instructions: Draw around the template of the hand below and decorate the space around it. Write inside the hand things you could do to make someone feel included, e.g. invite them to join in your game, sit at the lunch table with them, smile at them. Afterwards, decorate the hand and the space around it.

Instructions: Design a rosette to give to someone in your class. What have they done that makes you proud of them? E.g. trying a harder book, being patient and persevering when climbing the rope in P.E., letting someone else have a turn on the swing etc. Tell the class and then present them with their rosette.

Instructions: Make a poster that reminds people about ways in which they can be kinder to the world and the people in it. It could mention ways of being kind in school (sharing what we have with others), at home (being patient with a sibling), online (being respectful to others), or to the environment (using recyclable materials), etc.

Instructions: In pairs, discuss what metaphors are used in *One moment, one people*. Does the songwriter mean literally being locked out? Why might people feel locked out and in what way can you make someone feel welcome and included? E.g. offering to show someone around school if they are new, sitting with someone different at lunchtime, etc. On the keys below, write out actions you will take this week to make someone feel included.
